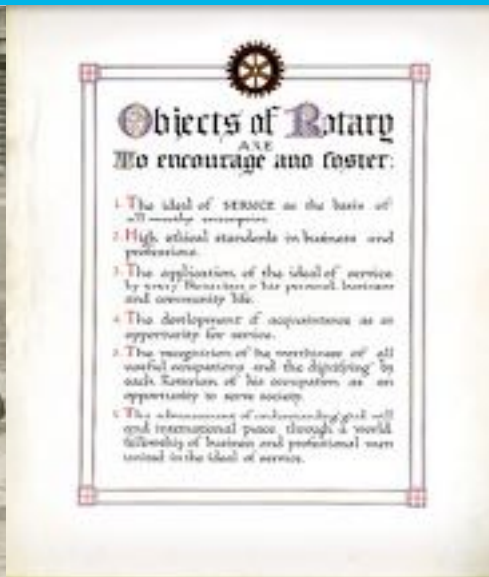
TRF CENTENNIAL GOALS

It seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of **doing good in the world**, in charitable, educational or other avenues of community progress ...

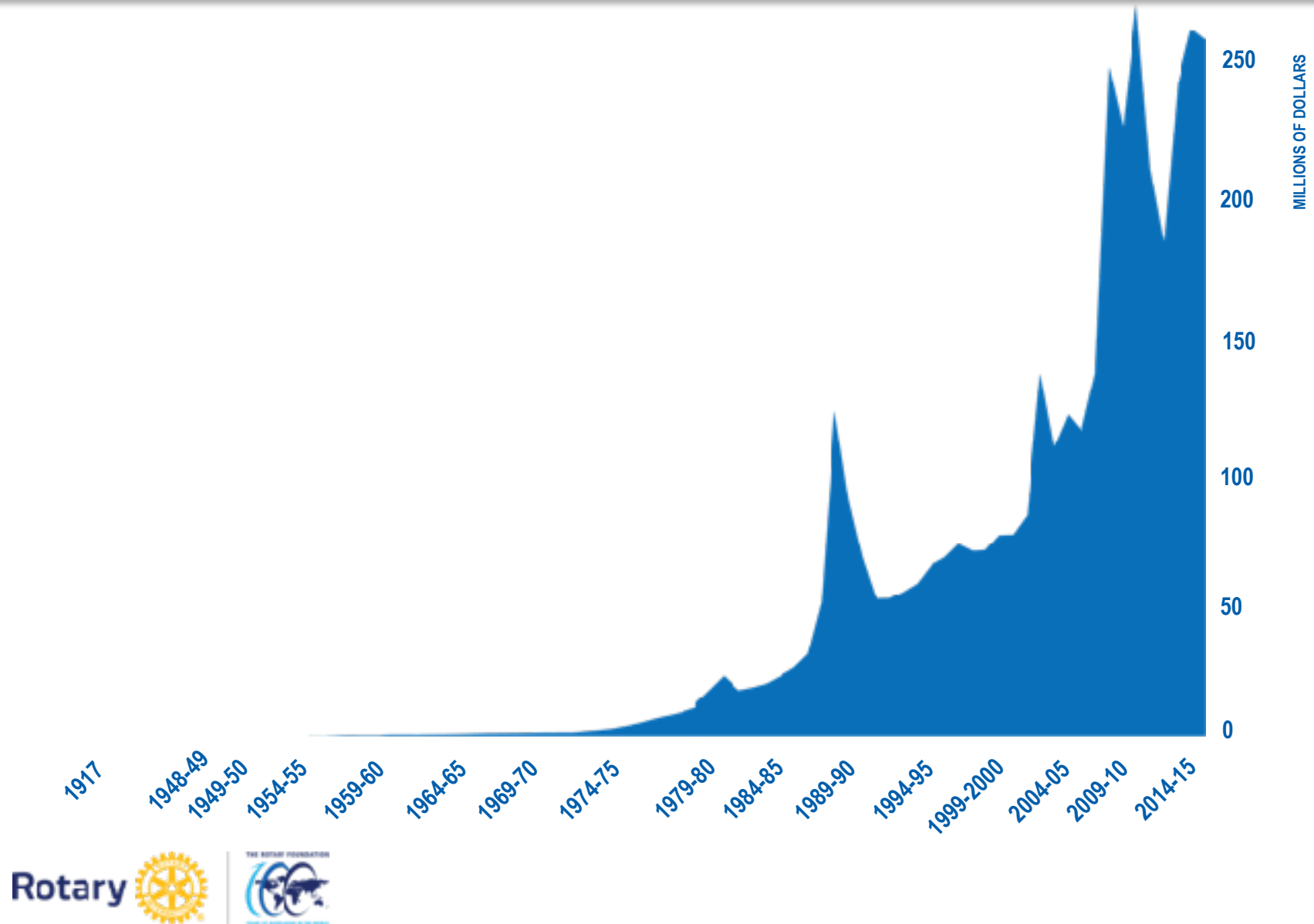

EVERETT T. ALCAN

"To be an intelligent citizen, I should understand and appreciate our European neighbors." That is why Mr. Alcan, of South Wisconsin, wishes to study at an English or Swiss university. A graduate of DePaul College, he headed the school's service organization last year. Writes president of his class, he was outstanding social, scholarly, and athletic leader.



JEFFERY HEATON ALDAM

This moral idealism will study U. S. history when he enters Harvard University this Fall. Graduate of Cambridge University. Defines history course will be his for post in foreign office of trading system. Graduate of Trinity College, Hartford, Conn. Served with distinction during D-Day month. Wounded during invasion of Normandy.



WILLIAM FIEELSON BARKER

Preparation for a vocational career is sought by this Ohio. He has a B.A. degree from Harvard College in Pennsylvania. There he was active in debating, radio, literature, student council, music, religious work, and variety sports. Writes to attend New College in Scotland or Cambridge in England. JACK IRELAND BOYD

This Middle, Arkansas, man seeks a career in the U. S. Department of State's foreign service. At the University of Geneva (Switzerland) he will study international relations. Study of human diseases, particularly in English college and hospital, is the aim of this native Romanian. A four-language speaker—English, French, American, and French—he is now a doctor at the Government Hospital in Salina, Pakistan. Served on faculty at the American University of Beirut in Syria. Outside interests: tennis, swimming, football, golf.

To learn more about metaphysics, the Belgian plans to study at Harvard M.I.T. (Massachusetts Institute of Technology). He graduated from the Free University of Brussels this year. 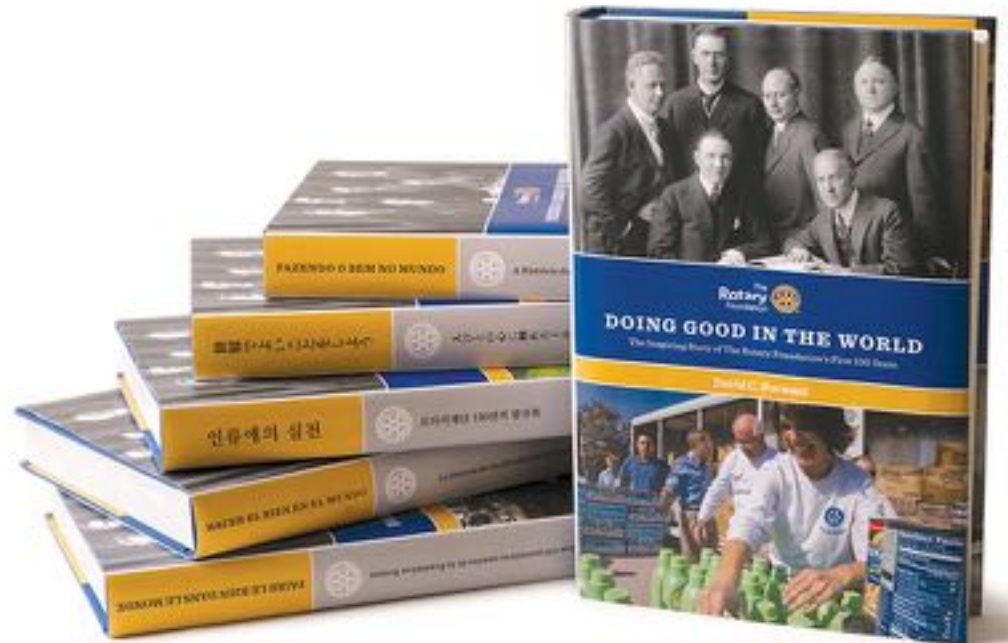

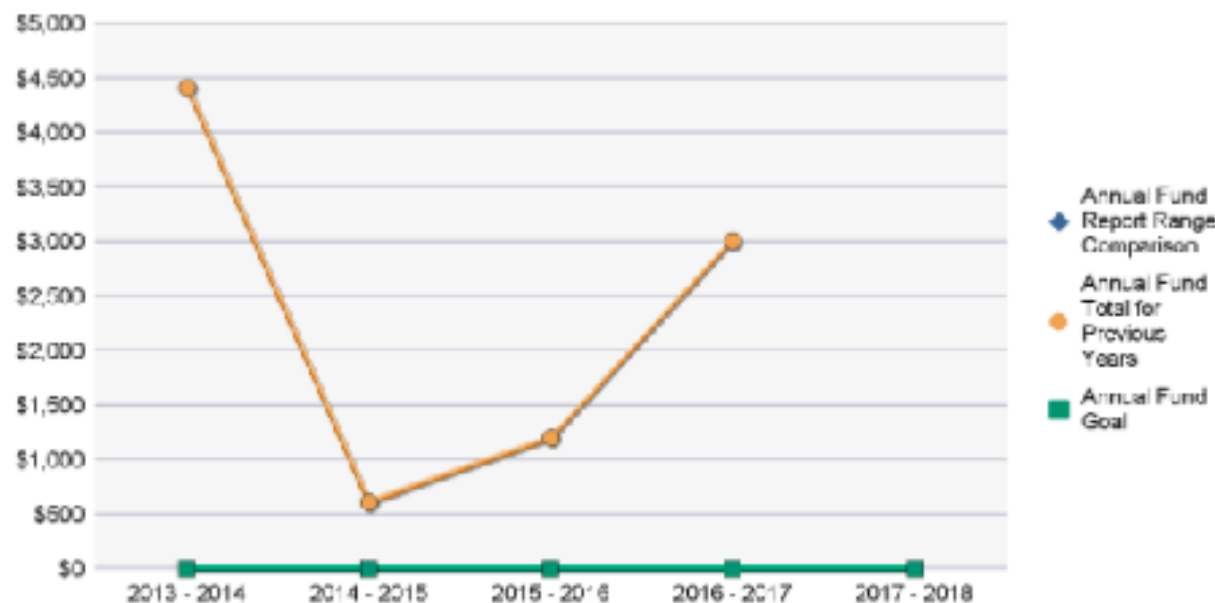

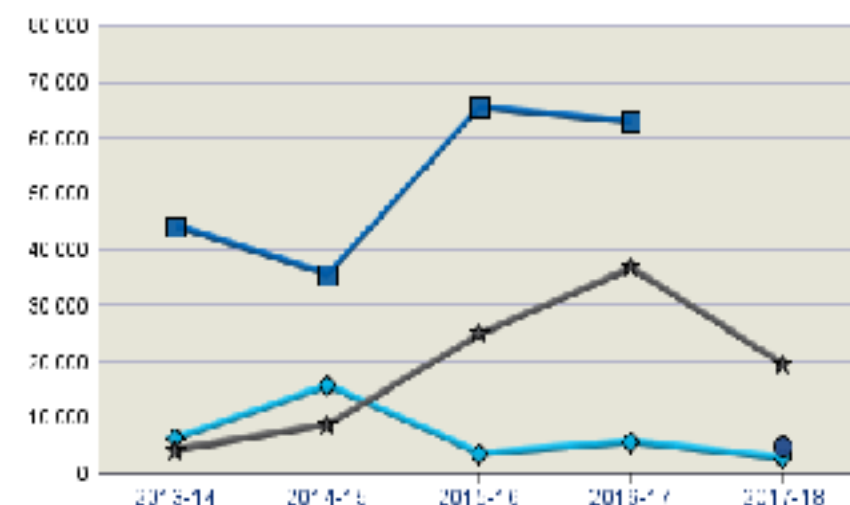
